Ashley Seltenrich

Dawson Creek, BC

Ashley Seltenrich is an Indigenous woman living with her 4-year old son with ASD and family in a small community in the South Peace Region in Northern BC. She believes community inclusion helps benefit her son for awareness and acceptance. Being in a small community has required her and her family to do heaps of research on resources to navigate for support and services. Living in the north is a struggle with limited resources, but she is thankful for the ones they have found for her son's early intervention therapy.

Brenda Lenahan

Cumberland, BC

Brenda is a solo mom to 6-year old Cole who has a rare genetic condition that closely mimics cerebral palsy and affects him neurodevelopmentally. Cole thrives when he is included in his community and the community has embraced him. Together they have navigated rural and urban service delivery models for early intervention, interprovincial health systems, and now they are exploring BC's different education options as Cole is engaged in home learning through a Distributed Learning school. Cole has taught her the importance of advocacy, the beauty in diversity and the value of inclusion.

Si Stainton

Delta, BC

Si Stainton is a single Mum of three wonderful adult children. Her son, who is now 20, has a developmental disability. She immigrated to Canada when her son was one, so has a lot of experience navigating several ministries and is grateful for the help and advice she received on her way, particularly from the Family Support Institute. As a family they love to hike, eat out, play board games and watch movies. Si now works part time for the Delta Community Living Society as a Family Services Manager providing information and advice to families with a relative with a developmental disability in Surrey and Delta.
