

- Navigators want to remain connected with one another



Guiding Principles in Navigation

- Transparent and open communication
- Emphasizing relationships and trust building practice
- Culturally safe and sensitive
- Trauma-informed
- Accessible and plain language
- Collaborative and cooperative
- Family is at the centre, there is respect for the family's voice and their expertise
- Flexible and individualized to each family

POSITIVE FEEDBACK

- + Better understanding of the different scopes of service of different providers
- + Changed how they intended to approach their work going forward
