


This year we've closed two major chapters in our ongoing **PICS** (Personal Impacts of COVID-19 Survey) study saga. After crunching the numbers from PICS I, we've learned more about how British Columbia's mental health has changed in the past couple years, and especially how that differs between different groups. Secondly, we've finished recruitment on PICS II, which dived into the nitty gritty of it all by interviewing dozens of participants on their own mental health struggles and triumphs. While each carries significant insight separately, we get the big picture data complemented by the nuance of personal accounts when we combine the two, and aim to present this to integral stakeholders and governing bodies to better serve communities where help is needed.



ACE-OCD (Adjunctive CElecoxib in childhood-onset OCD): Check out our first clinical trial to date which examines use of the anti-inflammatory drug celecoxib as an add-on to usual therapy in youth and children with OCD. This IOCDF-funded study is open to all youth in British Columbia with an OCD diagnosis between the ages of 7-18 years old. Click here for more information or contact us at aceocd@bcchr.ca

- GAYA (Genetic Architecture of Youth Anxiety): a CIHRfunded multi-site large scale genetic study of youth across Canada that will assess symptoms of anxiety and it's major comorbidities in order to understand the genetic underpinnings of anxiety.
- PGxSpark: a CIHR-funded study that wil evaluate an evidencebased pharmacogenetic testing service to improve drug treatment outcomes in children receiving mental health care.



Camp OCD celebrates its 10 year anniversary! In 2012, Dr. Evelyn Stewart and Dr. Katherine McKenney joined forces to create a program in BC dedicated to offering cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT) for OCD. Starting with just their rag-tag team of two, determination and grit has grown the program to include a collective of various social workers, psychologists, psychiatrists, students, and trainees. Ten years and innumerable families later, the Provincial OCD & Psychiatric program remains steadfast in providing effective care and teaching skills to families struggling with OCD.
